Preposition of movement

Preposition – word or a group of words used before a noun or a pronoun to show direction, time, place, location or to introduce an object.

Preposition of direction / movement

– prepositions of movement are

across

through

into

over

down

up

past

around



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These prepositions add specific context (statement or idea) to the movement.

Across / through

ACROSS is the movement from one side of the area to another side.

There is a bridge across the river.



THROUGH is the movement from one side to another side in an enclosed space.

The train went through the dark tunnel.



Into / out of

INTO: It denotes going from outside to inside space.

He dived into the pool.



OUT OF: It denotes going outside from an enclosed space.

The employee was thrown out of the office.



Onto / off

ONTO & OFF refer to surfaces.

Use ONTO to denote movement from down to up.



The toddler is trying to get onto the chair.



Use OFF to denote movement from up to down.



The boy fell off the tree.



Up / down

Both these refer to physical movement.

The man is climbing up the stairs.

The boy is going down the slide.



They can also denote increase & decrease.

The price of petrol always goes up and seldom comes down.

Around / along

AROUND is going in a circular motion .

The python coiled around the branch.



ALONG is following a line.

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The woman is walking along the foot path.



Towards / away from

TOWARDS : use it when the object is closer to something.

The boy ran towards his mom.



AWAY FROM: use it to denote when the object is farther from something.



The ship sailed away from the shore.

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across – when referring to movement from one side to another.

Ex: i) The ball rolled **across** the field.

ii) He swam **across** the lake yesterday.

through – when referring to movement from inside to outside or outside to inside.

Ex: i) The baseball went **through** the window.

ii) The train goes **through** a tunnel under the hill.

iii) The bullet went straight **through** him.

into – when referring to movement that enters or looks inside.

Ex: i) He went **into** the haunted building.

ii) He got **into** the car and closed the door.

iii) Priya swam **into** the water to rescue the dog.

over – extending directly upwards from

Ex: i) The car travelled **over** the slippery road.

ii) There were papers lying all **over** the place.

down – in a lower place.

Ex: i) She fell down.

ii) He watched the sun go **down**.

iii) The rocks rolled **down** the mountain.

up – at a higher point.

Ex: i) She went **up** the stairs.

ii) The man climbed **up** the mountain.

iii) The balloon is **up** in the air.

past – beyond (away)

Ex: i) I walked **past** the school.

ii) Months went **past** and nothing

happened.

around – movements in circles or from one place to another.

Ex: i) We sat **around** the table.

ii) She wore a scarf **around** her neck.

iii) I walked **around** the side of the building.

**FROM**

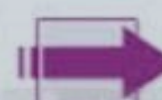
She comes **from** Japan.

**AROUND**
