- ❖ He can run very fast.
- ❖ The athlete sprinted towards the finish line.

❖ **A blessing in disguise** – Something that seems bad at first but turns out to be good.

❖ *Losing that job was a blessing in disguise; it led me to a better career opportunity.*

❖ **Burn the midnight oil** – To work late into the night.

❖ *She burned the midnight oil to prepare for her final exams.*

❖ **Bite the bullet** – To face a difficult situation bravely.

❖ *I didn't want to apologize, but I had to bite the bullet and do it.*

❖ **Break the ice** – To start a conversation in a social setting.

❖ *The teacher played a fun game to break the ice on the first day of school.*

❖ **Hit the nail on the head** – To describe exactly what is causing a situation.

❖ *When he said the problem was poor management, he really hit the nail on the head.*

- ❖ **Once in a blue moon** – Something that happens very rarely.
 - ❖ *We go out for dinner as a family once in a blue moon.*
- ❖ **A penny for your thoughts** – Asking someone to share what they are thinking.
 - ❖ *You seem deep in thought. A penny for your thoughts?*
- ❖ **Spill the beans** – To reveal a secret.
 - ❖ *Rita spilled the beans about the surprise party.*
- ❖ **Let the cat out of the bag** – To accidentally reveal a secret.
 - ❖ *John let the cat out of the bag about our trip before we could tell everyone.*
- ❖ **Actions speak louder than words** – What someone does is more important than what they say.
 - ❖ *He promised to help, but actions speak louder than words.*

- ❖ **Add fuel to the fire** – To make a bad situation worse.
 - ❖ *Yelling at him when he's already angry will just add fuel to the fire.*
- ❖ **Beat around the bush** – To avoid saying something directly.
 - ❖ *Stop beating around the bush and tell me what happened.*
- ❖ **Cry over spilt milk** – To be upset over something that cannot be changed.
 - ❖ *There's no use crying over spilt milk; we need to fix the mistake and move on.*
- ❖ **Hit the books** – To study hard.
 - ❖ *Exams are coming up, so I need to hit the books.*
- ❖ **Let sleeping dogs lie** – To avoid bringing up an issue that might cause trouble.
 - ❖ *I decided not to argue and let sleeping dogs lie.*
- ❖ **By the skin of one's teeth** – Just barely managing to do something.
 - *He passed the exam by the skin of his teeth.*

- ❖ **Make a mountain out of a molehill** – To exaggerate a small problem.
- ❖ *It's just a minor mistake; don't make a mountain out of a molehill.*
- ❖ **The ball is in your court** – It is now your decision or responsibility to act.
- ❖ *I have given you all the options; now the ball is in your court.*
- ❖ **Throw in the towel** – To give up.
- ❖ *After failing three times, he finally threw in the towel and quit the competition.*
- ❖ **Under the weather** – Feeling sick.
- ❖ *I won't be coming to school today as I'm feeling under the weather.*
- ❖ **Walk on eggshells** – To be very careful with your words or actions.
- ❖ *Ever since their argument, I've been walking on eggshells around them.*

Cost an arm and a leg – Very expensive.

- *That designer bag costs an arm and a leg!*

❖ **Every cloud has a silver lining** – There is something good in every bad situation.

❖ **Put all your eggs in one basket** – To risk everything on a single plan.

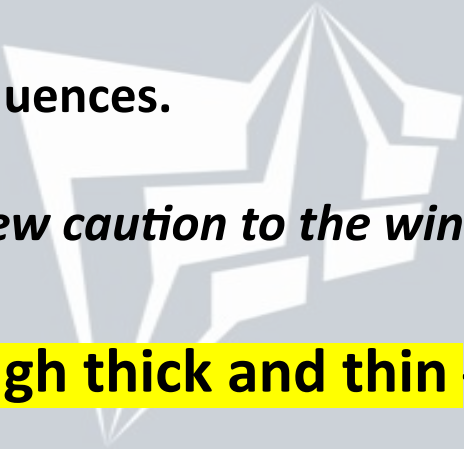
❖ *Don't put all your eggs in one basket—invest in different places.*
