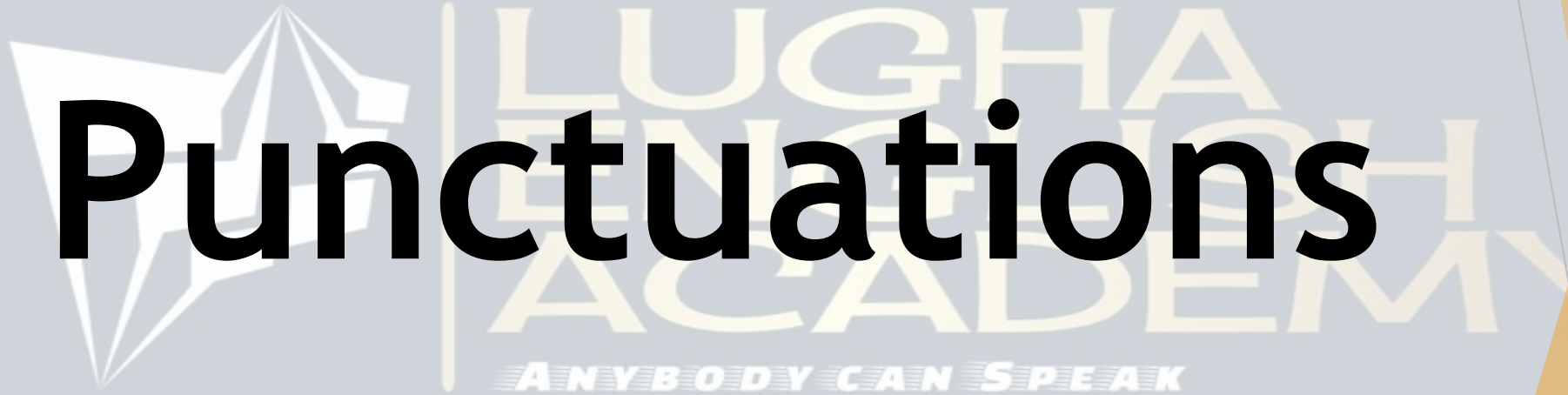


Punctuations



1. Period (.)

► Use: Ends declarative sentences and abbreviations.

□ Examples:

□ She likes to read.

□ Smith is our teacher.

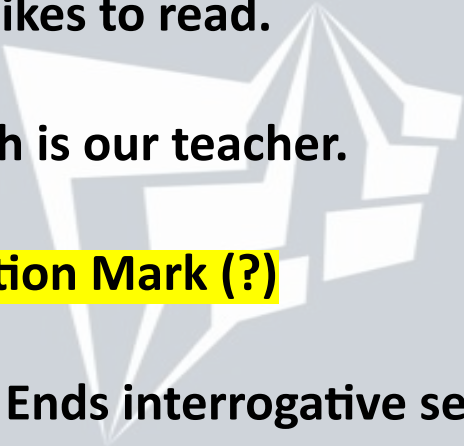
2. Question Mark (?)

► Use: Ends interrogative sentences.

□ Examples:

□ What are you doing?

□ Have you finished your homework?



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▶ 3. Exclamation Mark (!)

- Use: Shows strong emotion or emphasis.
 - Example: Watch out!

▶ 4. Comma (,)

- Use:
 - ☐ Separates items in a list.
 - ☐ Example: I bought apples, oranges, bananas, and grapes.
 - ☐ Introduces a pause in a sentence.
 - ☐ Example: After the meeting, we went home.
 - ☐ Sets off introductory elements or additional information.
 - ☐ Example: My friend, who lives in Canada, is visiting.

► 5. Apostrophe (')

- Use:

- ☐ To show possession.

- ☐ Example: Sarah's book.

- ☐ To form contractions.

- ☐ Example: Don't (do not).

► 6. Quotation Marks (" ")

- ☐ Use: Indicate direct speech or quotations.

- ☐ Example: She said, "I'll be there soon."

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▶ 7. Colon (:)

- Use:

- ☐ Introduces a list, explanation, or example.

- ☐ Example: Bring the following: pencils, notebooks, and a ruler.

- ☐ Before a formal statement or quotation.

- ☐ Example: He announced: "The show will start at 8 PM."

▶ 8. Semicolon (;)

- Use:

- ☐ Links closely related independent clauses.

- ☐ Example: I have a meeting tomorrow; it starts at 9 AM.

- ☐ Separates complex list items.

- ☐ Example: We visited Paris, France; Rome, Italy; and Berlin, Germany.

▶ 9. Dash (—)

☐ Use: Adds emphasis, interrupts, or provides additional information.

☐ Example: She was thinking about one thing—success.

▶ 10. Hyphen (-)

☐ Use: Joins words to form compound terms.

▶ Example: A well-known author.

▶ 11. Parentheses ()

☐ Use: Adds extra information or clarifies something.

☐ Example: She finally got her dream job (after years of hard work).

▶ 12. Ellipsis (...)

☐ Use: Indicates a pause, unfinished thought, or omitted text.

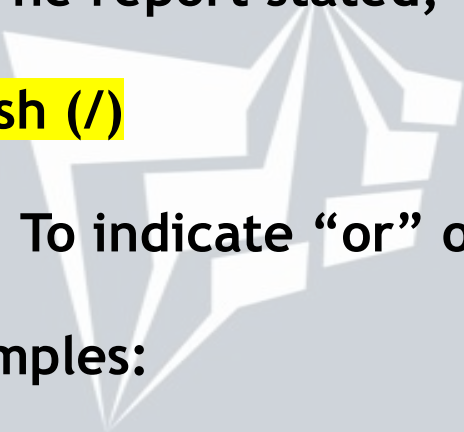
☐ Example: "Well... I'm not sure about that."

13. Bracket []

- Use: To add information or explanations within a quotation.
- Examples:
 - The report stated, “He [the manager] was unavailable.”

14. Slash (/)

- Use: To indicate “or” or a choice between options.
- Examples:
 - You can bring your notebook and/or a tablet.

 - ✓ Include: parentheses to add extra information, a semicolon, and an exclamation mark.
