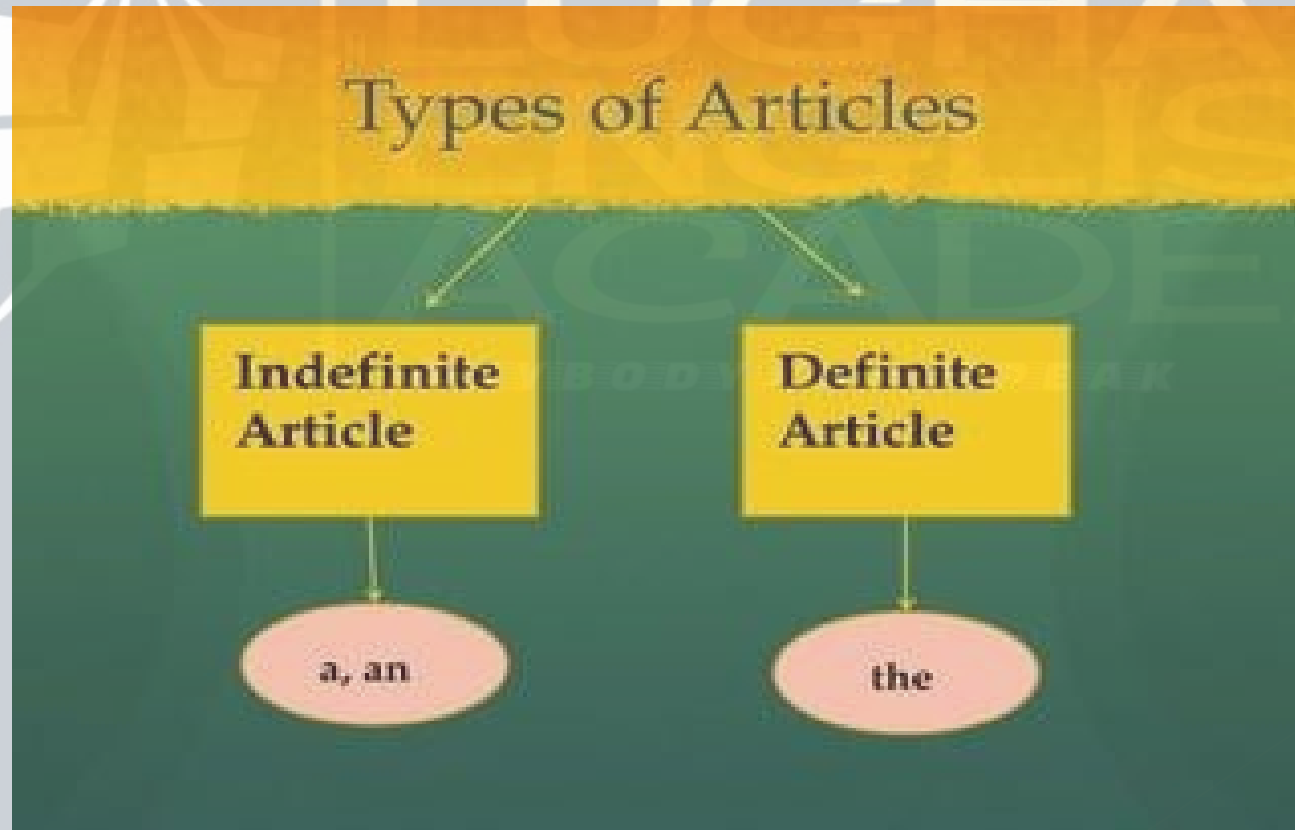

- ▶ **Definition of Articles**
- ▶ Articles are words used before nouns to indicate whether the noun is specific or general. In English, there are three articles: a, an, and the.



► Types of Articles

1. Definite Article

- ☐ The: Used to refer to a specific person, place, thing, or idea that is already known to the speaker and listener.
- ☐ Example: The sun is shining.
- ☐ Explanation: The word "sun" refers to a unique and specific object.

2. Indefinite Articles

- ☐ A and An: Used to refer to a non-specific or general person, place, thing, or idea.
- ☐ A: Used before singular nouns that begin with a consonant sound.
- ☐ Example: A dog barked at night.
- ☐ An: Used before singular nouns that begin with a vowel sound.
- ☐ Example: An apple fell from the tree.

▶ Detailed Explanation of Indefinite Articles "A" and "An"

▶ 1. Purpose of Indefinite Articles

☐ Indefinite articles indicate that the noun they modify is not specific or unique.

☐ Example:

☐ I saw a bird in the sky.

☐ Explanation: The word "a" suggests that it could be any bird, not a specific one.

▶ 2. When to Use "A"

☐ "A" is used before nouns that begin with a consonant sound, regardless of whether the letter is a vowel or consonant.

☐ Example:

☐ She has a car.

☐ He saw a university.

☐ Why "a university"?

The word "university" starts with a vowel letter but has a consonant sound /ju:/ ("yoo").



▶ 3. When to Use "An"

- "An" is used before nouns that begin with a vowel sound, regardless of whether the letter is a vowel or consonant.
 - Example:
 - He ate an apple.
 - She waited for an hour.
 - Why "an hour"?

The word "hour" starts with a consonant letter, but the "h" is silent, making the first sound a vowel sound /auer/.

▶ 4. Use with Singular Countable Nouns

- ▶ Indefinite articles can only be used with singular countable nouns.
- Correct: I need a pen.
- Incorrect: I need a water. (Water is uncountable.)

▶ 5. Indicating One of Many (Non-Specific Reference)

- ▶ Use "a" or "an" when the noun is one of many and not specifically identified.

- Example:

- She wants to buy a book. (It can be any book.)
- He needs an umbrella. (It can be any umbrella.)

▶ 6. Referring to Something Mentioned for the First Time

- ▶ Use "a" or "an" when introducing a noun for the first time in a conversation or story.

- Example:

- I saw a man in the park. The man was jogging.
- Explanation: "A man" is introduced as a new subject. Later, "the man" refers to the same person.

▶ 7. Referring to a Job, Role, or Profession

- ▶ Use "a" or "an" before nouns that describe a person's job, role, or profession.

- Example:

- She is a teacher.
- He wants to become an astronaut.

▶ 8. Describing a Single Unit of Measurement

- ▶ Use "a" or "an" when referring to a unit of measurement or time.

- Example:

- Gasoline costs \$3 a gallon.
- I earn Rs.200 an hour.

▶ 9. Indicating Quantity (Meaning "One")

- ▶ Use "a" or "an" when you mean "one" but want to sound less precise or casual.

- Example:

- Can I have a minute of your time?
- There's an orange in the fridge.

▶ 10. Use with Numbers and Fractions

- ▶ Indefinite articles are used before numbers and fractions when indicating quantity.

- Example:

- A hundred people attended the event.
- He ate a half of the pie.

▶ 11. Use in Exclamations

▶ Indefinite articles are used in exclamatory expressions.

• Example:

- What a beautiful day!
- Such an amazing performance!



► Special Cases and Exceptions

1. Words Starting with a Silent "H"

- Use "an" if the "h" is silent.
 - Example: An hour, An honest man.
- Use "a" if the "h" is pronounced.
 - Example: A house, A horse.

2. Words Starting with "U" or "Eu"

- Use "a" if the word starts with a /ju:/ sound (like "you").
 - Example: A university, A European city.
- Use "an" if the word starts with a vowel sound.
 - Example: An unusual event.

3. Abbreviations and Acronyms

- Use "a" or "an" based on the sound of the first letter, not the letter itself.
 - Example:
 - An MBA (M is pronounced /em/, a vowel sound).
 - A USB port (U is pronounced /ju:/, a consonant sound).

▶ When NOT to Use Indefinite Articles

1. Before Uncountable Nouns

- ▶ Incorrect: I drank a water.
- ▶ Correct: I drank some water.

2. Before Plural Nouns

- ▶ Incorrect: She has a books.
- ▶ Correct: She has some books.

3. With Proper Nouns

- ▶ Incorrect: He met a John.
- ▶ Correct: He met John.

▶ Detailed Explanation of Definite Article "The"

▶ 1. Referring to Specific Nouns

- "The" is used when the noun being mentioned is already known or has been previously introduced.

- Example:

- I saw a cat. The cat was sitting on the roof.

- Explanation: "The cat" refers to the same cat already mentioned.

▶ 2. Referring to Unique Objects

- "The" is used before singular or plural nouns that are one of a kind or universally recognized.

- Example:

- The sun is shining brightly.

- He visited the Eiffel Tower during his trip to Paris.

- Explanation: "Sun" and "Eiffel Tower" are unique and easily identifiable.

▶ 3. Referring to Specific Groups or Categories

- "The" is used before nouns representing an entire category or group.

- Example:

- The tiger is a magnificent animal.

- The poor need our help.

- Explanation: "The tiger" refers to all tigers as a group, and "the poor" refers to all impoverished people.

▶ 4. Referring to Nouns Modified by Adjectives or Phrases

- "The" is used before nouns that are described by additional phrases or clauses.

- Example:

- She is the girl who won the competition.

- They stayed at the hotel near the beach.

- Explanation: The phrases "who won the competition" and "near the beach" make the nouns specific.

▶ 5. Referring to Superlatives and Ordinals

- "The" is used before superlative adjectives and ordinal numbers.
 - Example:
 - He is the tallest boy in the class.
 - She was the first to arrive.
 - Explanation: Superlatives (e.g., tallest, best) and ordinals (e.g., first, second) imply specificity.

▶ 6. Referring to Specific Locations or Directions

- "The" is used with names of geographical areas, oceans, rivers, mountain ranges, and deserts.
 - Example:
 - The Pacific Ocean is vast.
 - We hiked in the Alps.
 - Explanation: These are specific and well-known places.
- It is also used for directions:
 - Example:
 - Turn to the left.
 - Drive towards the north.



▶ 7. Referring to Objects Common in a Particular Context

- In certain contexts, "the" can refer to objects that are commonly understood in that situation.
 - Example:
 - He went to the doctor.
 - Please pass me the salt.
 - Explanation: "The doctor" refers to a specific one known in the context, and "the salt" refers to the one on the table

▶ 8. Referring to Time Periods or Historical Events

- "The" is used before names of specific historical events, eras, or time periods.
 - Example:
 - The Renaissance was a time of great innovation.
 - He loves reading about the Middle Ages.
 - Explanation: These are unique and specific periods in history.

▶ 9. Referring to Instruments or Means

- "The" is used when referring to means or instruments in a general sense.
 - Example:
 - He plays the piano beautifully.
 - We traveled by the train.
 - Explanation: These refer to instruments or transport generally but are understood specifically in context.

▶ 10. Referring to Specific Titles or Names

- "The" is often used with titles, newspapers, and organizations.
 - Example:
 - The Times is a popular newspaper.
 - He works for the United Nations.

► When NOT to Use "The"

1. With proper nouns (unless referring to something specific):

☐ Incorrect: The John is my friend.

☐ Correct: John is my friend.

2. With uncountable nouns when speaking in general terms:

☐ Incorrect: The water is essential for life.

☐ Correct: Water is essential for life.

3. With plural nouns when referring to them generally:

☐ Incorrect: The dogs are loyal animals.

☐ Correct: Dogs are loyal animals.
